Enjoy an ice cream cone together. A double scoop is best.


Take about how delicious the cone is. "It's as good as walking on the beach in the summer..." It's as good as..."

Talk about taste, smell, touch, sound (Does ice cream make a sound?), sight.


ENJOY the cone. Laugh. MMM. catch the scoop in your hand when it falls.


